Farmer and surgeon. Taken at Carlisle on its surrender.—S.P.D., 79, 26. Pleaded guilty at his trial, and begged for mercy, but was sentenced to death.—Scots Mag., July 1746, 320, Jan. 1747, 45; Baga, lxix. 172.

Banff

 Merchant and magistrate. He was said to have 'assisted in collecting money.'

Was taken at the surrender of Carlisle, and sent to London, where he was tried and convicted of high treason and sentenced to death. His estate was forfeited. At his trial evidence showed that he had fired a cannon in the direction of the Duke's Headquarters. On the other hand, Sir John Cope gave somewhat dubious evidence that he may have been the Banff magistrate who had supplied him with carriages and horses, and assisted him when he went north to Inverness.

Though found guilty he was pardoned on 16th Dec. 1746, but died in April 1747, and was buried in the churchyard of St. Margaret's, Westminster.—P.C., 24, 369; S.P.D., 79-26; Scots Mag., 1746, 527, 594; Allardyce, ii. 464; Egerton MSS., 2000-49.

Tyrie, Aberdeen '4 years with Lochiel as gardener at Achnacary. Never out.' This may have been the man described as an 'overseer of highways' who joined the Prince in Edinburgh.—S.P.D., 87-122, 88-60; Entry Book, 84; P.C., 86.

Manchester. Lancashire

19 Englishman, Labourer.—S.P.D., 88-124, 79-26; P.R., 3621-3. He gave evidence against the officers of his Regiment at their trial.-Allardyce, ii. 384, 389, etc.

This may have been the farmer of Moss-side, Banff; or the Alloa wright who 'joined the rebels about the time of Preston battle, was made serjeant of artillery and continued with them till dispersed'; or the weaver of Fetteresso, Kincardine, who 'carried arms as a Serjeant and was active in taking up horses for the rebel service.'—P.C., 24, 146, 194. His fate is not known.

When he got to London he was placed in irons in Newgate, and he remained without trial in prison for one and a half years, when he was released on bail on 28th Feb. 1747. He was in London until 18th November and then returned to Scotland. His later life ended in a tragedy. On 4th Sept. 1767 he murdered one William Cairns, was tried and hanged, probably on 30th Oct., at Stirling -Lyon, iii. 166. 180; Johnston, i. 30; Murray, 126.

After Culloden he concealed himself, but was ultimately caught, sent to London, and brought up for trial; but the case against him failed in consequence of some technical error in the indictment. Though at first inclined to the Government side, Lord Cromartie ultimately declared for the Prince and joined the Army at Perth. He was employed in collecting money in Fife, and was present at the battle of Falkirk on 17th January 1746. He took over command of Kilmarnock's Guards for a time. He was put in command of the operations against the Earl of Loudon, and pursued him for some time without success, and was superseded. On 15th April he was captured by the Sutherland Militia, sent to London, and committed to the Tower. On 28th July 1746 he was tried before the House of Lords, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to death, with forfeiture of estates and honours. He was respited on 9th August largely through the instrumentality of his wife and some of his friends who interceded for him. On 18th Feb. 1748 he was allowed to leave the Tower and to live in the house of a messenger. On 4th Oct. 1749 he had a pardon on condition of his confining himself during his life to such part of England as His Majesty shall, from time to time, direct. In 1757 he raised and became Colonel of the Fraser Highlanders, and served with it in America under Wolfe, and was twice wounded. In 1762 he was sent as Brigadier-General to Portugal. In 1774 his forfeited estates were returned to him on payment of £21,000. In 1776 he raised two more Highland battalions. In his last speech he referred to the denunciation of him by the notorious George Miller, town clerk of Perth, who was responsible for many deaths of Jacobites.—S.P.D., 88-16; Mackintosh, Ogilvy's Regt., 115; Lyon, i. 1-20; Baga, lxix. 187.

REPORT OF THE FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SCOTTISH HISTORY SOCIETY

THE FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY WAS held on Saturday, 1st December 1928, in Dowell's Rooms, George Street, Edinburgh,—Sir D. Y. Cameron, R.A., R.S.A., LL.D., in the Chair.

The Report of the Council was as follows:-

During the past year twenty-nine members have died or resigned, twenty new members and three libraries have been enrolled, and the membership, including libraries, is now 649 as compared with 655 last year.

The Society has this year lost two distinguished members in Dr. Walter B. Blaikie and Dr. William Mackay. They had in common an intense love for Scotland, and for the Highlands and Islands in particular. They each had many interests and occupations, but each found time to do much, and in many ways, for their countrymen. Dr. Mackay made them his debtors not only by his own writings, but by founding and guiding the Gaelic Society of Inverness; and the Extracts from the Presbytery Records of Inverness and Dingwall, and the other volumes which he edited for the Society, are among its most useful publications. Dr. Blaikie's work on the 'Forty-Five, and especially his invaluable Itinerary of Prince Charles Edward published by the Society, will endure as a monument of his power and patience in sifting truth from rumour and tradition. Their many friends would wish also to remember their

enthusiasm and loyalty, and the charm and staunchness of their friendship.

The Council also desire to place on record the gratitude of the Society to Professor R. K. Hannay and Mr. William Angus, who resigned office as Joint Honorary Secretaries in February last. In addition to their onerous labours as general editors of publications, they successfully steered the Society through the difficult post-war years. The Council nominated in their place Dr. H. W. Meikle, Keeper of the Manuscripts in the National Library of Scotland, and they recommend that the appointment be confirmed. Mr. Curle, Dr. MacNaughton, and Dr. Dickson retire by rotation from the Council, and it is recommended that they be re-elected. To fill the two other vacancies the Council suggest the names of Mr. Evan M. Barron and Mr. John A. Inglis, K.C.

The large increase in the membership of the Society, reported last year, has hitherto enabled the Council to issue two volumes a year without raising the annual subscription, and members are again urged to bring the claims of the Society before those interested in its objects in order that this highly satisfactory state of affairs may be maintained.

The accounts, appended in abstract, show a credit balance of £446, 15s. 10d. on 11th November 1928.

The Sheriff Court Book of Fife, 1515-1522, edited by Dr. W. C. Dickinson, and The Prisoners of the '45, vol. i., edited by Sir Bruce Seton, Bt., and Mrs. Jean Gordon Arnot, have been issued to members during the current year. As the complete record of a Sheriff Court for the period which it covers, Dr. Dickinson's volume is the first of its kind to be published, and it has been welcomed as one of the most fruitful contributions to the constitutional history of Scotland made in recent years. The Prisoners of the '45, in addition to its historical importance, will have, for many members of the Society, a keen personal interest. Volumes ii. and iii., which contain an annotated alphabetical list of the prisoners, are in

the press, and will be sent out shortly as the two publications for 1928-1929. The thanks of the Society are due to Dr. Dickinson, Sir Bruce Seton, and Mrs. Arnot.

The volumes in preparation include the 'Miscellany Volume' reported last year, and the second volume of the Register of the Consultations of the Ministers of Edinburgh, the first volume of which was issued in 1921. Professor Rait's King James's Secret and the few extracts and notes in Tytler's History of Scotland indicate the varied interest of the 'Warrender Papers,' which are being edited by Professor Rait and Miss Annie Cameron, Other volumes under consideration include 'Documents relating to Kirkcudbright,' edited by Mr. R. C. Reid; a 'Regesta Regum Scotorum, 1094-1304,' by Mr. Hunter Marshall; a 'General Index' to the First Series of the Society's publications; 'The Expenditure Book of John Clerk of Eldin, 1769-1786; and 'The Minutes of the Justices of the Peace for Lanarkshire, 1707-1723.' The Council would welcome any information regarding diaries, memoirs, letters, or other material suitable for publication by the Society.

The Council was afforded an opportunity of giving its opinion to the Royal Commission on National Museums and Galleries on the question of the allocation of documents as between H.M. General Register House and the National Library; and in a memorandum it expressed the view that, in the event of the question ever arising for determination, the Register House is the proper place of deposit for documents similar in kind to Public Records, that all documents of general historical, biographical, and literary interest should be allocated to the National Library, but that collections of family papers should not be broken up unless for some exceptional reason.

The Chairman, in moving the adoption of the Report, gave a short address on 'The Romance of Scottish History.' Romance in history, he said, was that spell of mystic beauty, haunted by strangeness of form and colour, remote from the facts and feelings

of common life. It did not imply lack of strength, but associated itself with very noble, exalted, and even austere shapes, veiled perhaps by distance, or muted by the fading light and gathering darkness. The term 'romance' might be most appropriately associated with Scottish history. They dared not strip life of its golden age and time of glamour, in which found birth the thoughts which stimulated and inspired. A nation became great through its imaginings and its visions, and above all through its faith; therefore, if they would stir a nobler patriotism, they must serve and sacrifice, and glean from the pages of history all that was of good report, in remembrance of the glorious dead, and prepare a better country for those who were to come after. Life and history were a weariness and disappointment bereft of faith and romance, but when these comrades of the higher world brought their glory and their glamour all things became new.

The Hon. Lord Sands, in seconding the motion for the adoption of the Report, referred to the question of the re-organisation of H.M. General Register House which had been discussed at previous meetings. One official had now been placed in control of the national records, and there was a prospect of the desires expressed by the Society being realised.

Sir James Balfour Paul moved that the Hon. Treasurer and the Members of Council retiring by rotation be re-elected, that the appointment of the Hon. Secretary be confirmed, and that Mr. Evan M. Barron and Mr. John A. Inglis, K.C., be elected to fill the two vacancies. A vote of thanks to the Chairman was moved by Mr. James MacLehose.

RULES

- 1. The object of the Society is the discovery and printing, under selected editorship, of unpublished documents illustrative of the civil, religious, and social history of Scotland. The Society will also undertake, in exceptional cases, to issue translations of printed works of a similar nature, which have not hitherto been accessible in English.
- 2. The affairs of the Society shall be managed by a Council, consisting of a Chairman, Treasurer, Secretary, and twelve elected Members, five to make a quorum. Three of the twelve elected Members shall retire annually by ballot, but they shall be eligible for re-election.
- 3. The Annual Subscription to the Society shall be One Guinea. The publications of the Society shall not be delivered to any Member whose Subscription is in arrear, and no Member shall be permitted to receive more than one copy of the Society's publications.
- 4. The Society will undertake the issue of its own publications, i.e. without the intervention of a publisher or any other paid agent.
- 5. The Society normally issues yearly two octavo volumes of about 320 pages each.
- 6. An Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held at the end of October, or at an approximate date to be determined by the Council.
- 7. Two stated Meetings of the Council shall be held each year, one on the last Tuesday of May, the other on the Tuesday preceding the day upon which the Annual General Meeting shall be held. The Secretary, on the request of three Members of the Council, shall call a special meeting of the Council.
- 8. Editors shall receive 20 copies of each volume they edit for the Society.
- 9. The owners of Manuscripts published by the Society will also be presented with a certain number of copies.
- 10. The Annual Balance-Sheet, Rules, and List of Members shall be printed.
- 11. No alteration shall be made in these Rules except at a General Meeting of the Society. A fortnight's notice of any alteration to be proposed shall be given to the Members of the Council.
